DIGNITY

PEACE



Peace is a cornerstone of the Catholic faith. Jesus, the Prince of Peace (Isaiah 9: 5-9), sacrificed himself with love to restore peace on earth. The importance of peace is reflected in Mass. Just before the exchange of peace that precedes communion, the priest says:

"Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles:

'Peace I leave you, my peace I give you.'"

"Peace... is an order that is founded in truth, nurtured and animated by charity, and brought into effect under the auspices of freedom."

THE COMMON GOOD



The common good means that the earth belongs to everyone. No one should be excluded from the gifts of creation. Pope Paul VI spoke about this 50 years ago in his encyclical *Populorum Progressio*.

SOLIDARITY



Solidarity arises when we remember that we belong to each other. Catholics reflect on the sense of community in a special way at Mass. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, 'The Eucharist commits us to the poor. To receive in truth the Body and Blood of Christ given up for us, we must recognise Christ in the poorest.'

THE DIGNITY OF WORK AND PARTICIPATION



The Catholic Church has always upheld the dignity of work and participation. People should always come before the pursuit of financial gain. Workers have the right to join trade unions, to a just wage, to spend time with their families and to rest. Work is an essential part of our human dignity, and everyone has the right to participate.

The option for the poor reminds Catholics of God's preferential love for the poorest and most vulnerable people in society. God's love is universal; he does not side with oppressors, but loves the humble.

CREATION AND ENVIRONMENT



In the first pages of the Bible, we read how God created the sun and the stars, the water and earth, and every creature. Catholics believe that the creation stories make it clear that humans have a duty to care for the earth. This duty is known as stewardship.

When reading the first story of Creation, Catholics recognise that it is a story about how God reveals his love, not a scientific account.
